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### UNIT NARRATIVE

This unit builds on the previous units on commercial photography by now exploring the challenge of photographing people. From portraits and fashion shoots to travel and corporate settings, working with people is a skill every photographer needs. Students will not only learn how to choose the proper equipment for these types of shoots but also how including people can enhance a photo’s story or purpose. Whether promoting a product, place, or idea, understanding how to work with human subjects is essential to creating engaging and marketable images.

The unit also focuses on building works for a strong photography portfolio. Students will learn how to select and organize their best work from this project with a goal of creating a cohesive collection tailored to specific audiences. In addition, the unit emphasizes soft skills like communication and time management, along with strategies to keep learning and growing as a photographer. By the end of the unit, students will have both the technical and professional tools to confidently showcase their work.

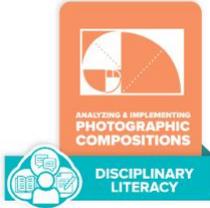

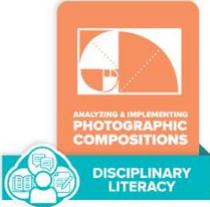

8. **Perspective:** The angle or viewpoint from which a photograph is taken. It affects how the subject and surroundings are perceived.
9. **Post-Processing:** The editing and enhancement of photos after they have been taken. This can include adjustments to exposure, color, sharpness, and other elements.
10. **Shutter Speed:** The length of time the camera shutter is open, allowing light to hit the camera sensor. It affects the exposure and motion blur in the image.
11. **Styling:** The process of selecting and arranging clothing, accessories, and props for a photo shoot to create a specific look or theme.
12. **Vantage Point:** The position from which a photograph is taken. Different vantage points can change the composition and impact of the image.
13. **Wide-Angle Lens:** A lens with a short focal length that captures a wider field of view. It is often used for landscapes, architecture, action, and creative perspectives.
